Board of Regents Meeting Recap

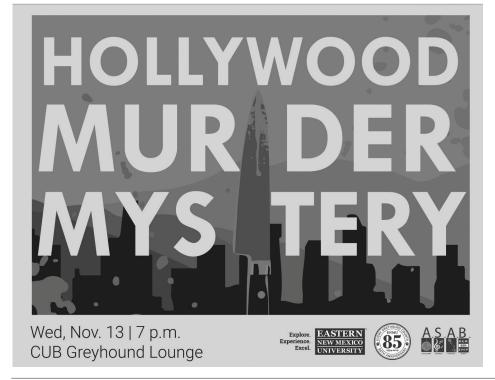
astern New Mexico University's Board of Regents met in the Administration Building on Nov. 1 to discuss new business with guests on the docket's agenda. First, the Board was visited by a group of students to voice their concerns on the university's absence in the observation of Martin Luther King Jr. Day. The students proposed that the university officially recognize that as a national holiday on campus and cancel classes and facilities in observation of the holiday so that students can participate in events that happen throughout the day. The proposal is tabled until next December so that the group has ample time to work with administration and student government to work out a schedule that would satisfy observation of the holiday and other university calendars.

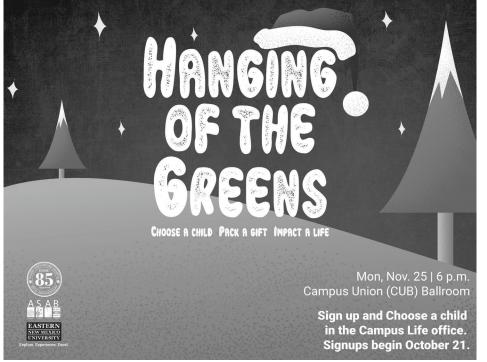
The Board of Regents had ENMU's first lady Edwina Gower as a guest to speak on a new Imagination Library Initiative being implemented at ENMU. The Imagination Library Initiative is a charitable organization that was started by American singer songwriter Dolly Parton. Dolly Parton's Imagination Library is a book gifting program that mails free, high-quality books to children from birth until they begin school, no matter their family's income. The program has received recognition from The Good Housekeeping Seal of Approval, Best Practices award from the Library of Congress Literacy. To get the Imagination Library

Initiative up and running the program requires as 501 c3 organization to manage the donations. The ENMU Foundation is the suggested organization to manage the program. The Initiative was voted and passed by the Board of Regents by a vote of 4-1.

The Board of Regents discussed and voted into effect a new tuition increase for the new fiscal year. The original proposed changes were a 3% increase to both tuition and student fees. The Board voted and passed an increase of only 2% and no increase to student fees. The new increases to tuition will go into effect in the upcoming fall semester 2020.

Some old business from the September Board of Regents meeting was also discussed. The proposal for the demolition rebuild/renovation of Hardy Hall. If the vote passes Hardy Hal will be either rebuilt or renovated to move departments out of the Student Academic Services building and into the what would be considered as the Hardy Welcome center. The campus administration will come up with a list of ideas and devise a Campus Master Plan of what needs to be fixed first across the university leading up to the next meeting. The estimated cost of the proposed project would be from 10-12 million dollars. The Board of regents will be voting on the continuation of the proposed project at the next Board meeting in December.

How to study abroad at ENMU

astern New Mexico University has opportunities for students ranging anywhere from tutoring, career services, counseling, and more. One of the programs offered by ENMU allows students to travel to foreign countries while working towards their degree. All of this is done with the student only needing to continue to pay tuition to ENMU.

Mei Reeder is the International Advisor and Recruiter for Eastern. She also is a main point of contact for students hoping to learn more about studying abroad. "You would come to me to begin the application process. It's also important that any student meets with their academic advisor to see what classes they need, and what is offered by potential host universities," said Reeder.

Having a basic understanding of the culture and language of potential host countries is very important for applicants. "If a student was wanting to study in Germany, it is very important that the student can speak German, for example. This is vital for host universities that don't specialize in language courses for exchange students," said Reeder.

Students wishing to study abroad would need to start the application process and think about which host university would be right for them. "All applications for this program are centralized, so we out our applications to be processed and overviewed before they are sent to any host countries," she said.

"Host universities take a look at the processed applications and make their final decisions as to who to take form there," Reeder said. Depending on the country, students may need to apply for a visa. In most cases, a passport will be sufficient for students. In any case, students ought to have all of their documents ready and information up to date If they are selected to study abroad.

There are many benefits for students wishing to study abroad. Other than the cultural richness and academic programs of host countries, there are other benefits that might not be immediately apparent. "Students only need to pay tuition to ENMU. This means a lot, especially with how expensive some of these universities can be," said Reeder.

"All of your credits you earn during your time away transfer back to ENMU. This means you don't slow down or stop getting your degree during your time there," she said. With the large selection of host universities from around the world, there are opportunities for study and learning that might not be as available in New Mexico.

Every opportunity comes with its own list of challenges, studying abroad Is no different. "I think that biggest challenge for students studying abroad would be the culture shock. Countries like England and Canada would probably be easy to adjust to simply because of the lack of a language barrier. Counties in South America and Asia might be a bit harder to get used to because of the culture and customs being so different," said Reeder.

"Food is another issue faced by some students. If the student is not familiar with the foods of their host country, it can be a problem faced very often. But those with open minds tend to experience a bit less culture shock. The important thing is to enjoy your time and attempt to embrace new ideas and customs," Reeder said.

There are so many options to study abroad for students at ENMU, most of which are at relatively little cost to those traveling. Studying abroad is a fantastic option to broaden your horizons, learn about varied cultures, and enjoy rare educational opportunities. Students and Faculty Give Tips on Resume and Interview Techniques

"A good resume is like your calling card; it shows the hiring team who you are in a complete yet succinct manner," said Dr. Mary Ayala, Dean of Liberal Arts and Sciences at Eastern New Mexico University. When you begin your resume, it changes over time. For example, when you are right out of school, you leave with very little experience but when you've been in the field for a while, you're able to add more work experience to your resume. "Your resume should contain evidence that you are building skill-sets that are relevant to the job you are seeking, and that you have succeeded in progressively demanding and responsible positions," said Ayala. "If you have only been able to work part-time jobs so far, focus less on the title and more on the responsibilities and proficiencies involved."

Ayala gave advice for interviews which included doing your homework about the potential employer. "Ask good questions during the interview that demonstrate your knowledge and interest," said Ayala.

"If you have several interviews lined up and you have any choice in the matter, save the ones you're most interested in for last. That will give you the chance to use the earlier interviews as practice runs," said Ayala. "If you must misrepresent yourself to get the job, you won't be happy, and neither will your employers." When it comes to references, give a heads up to anyone you are asking to be a referral for you. "Provide them with a current resume, a copy of the job description, and maybe a quick summary of highlights of your qualifications and why you're a good fit for the position." Ayala stated. "Having a good reference helps with the hiring decision. Very often, it is a stellar reference that tips the scale in a hiring decision."

Lastly, Ayala pointed out to not be afraid to showcase and sell the factors that set you apart from the rest like being bilingual, cross cultural experience, volunteer work, student leadership positions, or creative abilities. "All of these things could potentially set you apart from other applicants," Ayala said.

Ezekiel Huerta, a student at ENMU, said that a resume is a great way to represent yourself, your qualities, and your background when applying for a job or a new position. "In some cases, it can make you stand out and set you apart from others who are also

applying for the job. I believe the better you can get your resume gives you an opportunity to be successful," said Huerta. He shared his plan of wanting to be a personal trainer after graduation. He is currently on the football team and says that with this experience, it'll give him the upper hand and set him apart thus helpful on his resume.

Remember to be calm during an interview and always be yourself. "Don't try to put on a front that your over qualified. I would say just be you because that's who you're going to be when you're working there." In doing so, you won't have to put on a front the whole time you are working there. "If it's for you--it's for you. If it's not, then there's another job out there." Huerta said. "Just let them know then and there so you don't have to be worrying about it later."

Melina Encinias, a student at ENMU, said that it is important to keep your resume up to date. "It's important to be in a constant state of building a resume instead of reaching a point where you need to build a resume and then you have to go back and think back to all the past experiences you've had," said Encinias. "It's easier to do it cumulatively and keep it updated because if you need it, you have it ready."

Keeping your resume relevant to the job position is important. "Include job experience and if you've written anything and had it published be sure to include that in there." Encinias pointed out that it always depends on the resume you are writing. "The resume can be a general resume or it can be focused on the certain job you want. If you're going into music for example, and you've been to festivals and you've performed at places, you're going to want to include that. You're not going to want to include an English paper about cats that you have published."

"If they call you back that means they are interested in you so don't be too self-deprecating during it," Encinias said. "Things you've done in the past may seem little and you may not think it's enough, but sell yourself because the skill sets that you have are important and their valuable and they can be used in many ways." Being honest, Encinias said, is an important aspect to an interview. "Ask questions and don't be afraid to bargain with them. Tell them what you expect. They're trying to sell themselves to you as well because they want you to have the job."

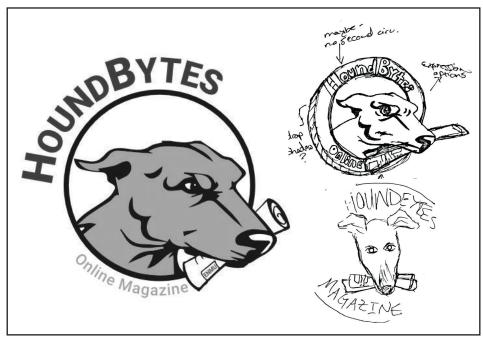
"My main goal is to set myself up to be able to pass on my experiences and knowledge to influence another potential designer," Mikki said.
